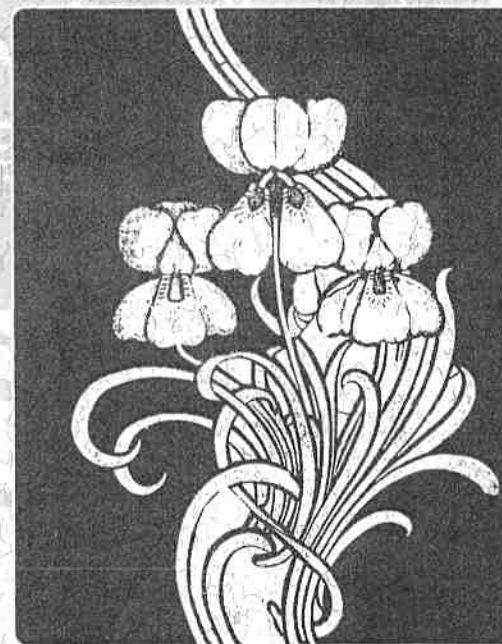


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Dear Friends,

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#1 109 Jefferson Drive

A landmark of this residence is the 85 foot tall lighted Christmas tree. Even though the home is located on a busy corner, privacy is ensured by a bank of white pines, lavender azaleas and white rhododendron. The driveway is lined with white pines interspersed with authentic railroad signs and train lights.

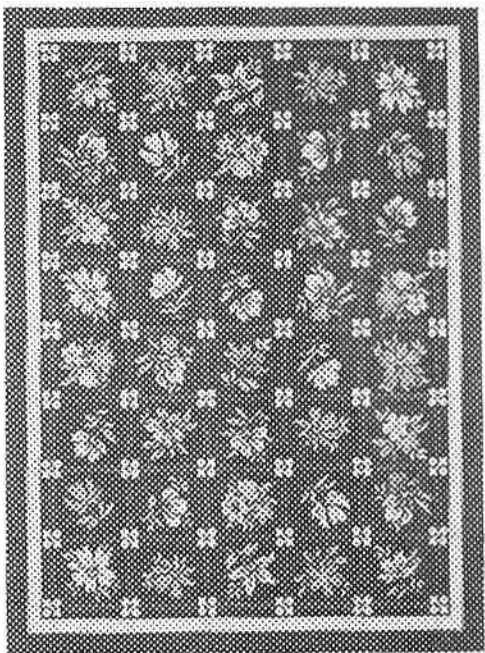
The red-bricked swimming pool is nicely landscaped with dwarf blue spruce, red barberry shrubs, Magnolia X soulangiana, ground hugging junipers, creeping Euonymus and several beds of flowering annuals. Along the side of the house is a weeping cherry tree, PJM azaleas, yellow climbing roses and dwarf blue spruce.

The owners enjoy eating from their yard. Big girl, plum and beefsteak tomatoes flourish in the yard. In one corner stands a sour cherry tree which produces enough bounty to fill three pies! The shining glory of the owners' garden is the potted herb and hot pepper grouping. Twenty-five giant pots house an abundant crop of basil, sage, oregano, Greek oregano, parsley and hot peppers. The pablano, serano, cayenne and habanero peppers are testimony to the owners' affinity for spicy gourmet cooking. Summer heat retained by the brick around the pool provides a southwestern environment conducive to the growth of these particular varieties of peppers.

#2 695 Moreland Drive at Kelso Road (lower)

Every person's garden. This house was a "gardener's special," requiring extensive yardwork to get it up to speed. It's a triangular lot bordering two streets with very little back yard. There were 75+ trees on the side and rear of the lot; many were dead or were crowding other trees. The owners removed the necessary trees and planted various shrubbery without compromising the privacy, intimacy and beauty this area provides. A

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gravel and weed driveway was paved, retaining wall replaced, patio added in the rear where no grass would grow. In the front of the house, trees were removed and/or replaced, shrubbery beyond pruning was replaced, beds were installed, lawn was reseeded, in-ground sprinkler system installed. The purpose of seeing this yard on tour is to see what anyone can do with an unusual and neglected lot, especially two people who work full-time and must work with a budget.

The owners like to feed the animals. "We have woodpeckers, gold and house finches, robins, doves, bluejays, wrens, squirrels, bunnies, and an occasional deer. It's fun to look out at our feeders and see who has come to visit. We also love to entertain on our patio -- it's our summer living room. Even though we work full-time, the yardwork is a hobby, a release and a pleasure!"

#3 781 Pinoak Road

This unique, formal Japanese garden features a lovely stone pathway, which leads to a symbolic tea garden, with its bench, light, and river arch stream bed. Many traditional Japanese techniques are enchantingly incorporated into the garden design, including rock placements in the style of a visual, asymmetrical balance, and the use of "Shakkei," or small hills which would allow the eye to "borrow" the scenery from far-off hills to deepen one's perspective. A classic "nobeclan" style brick path changes direction with angles instead of curves. The result is a magnificent garden which brings harmony to the viewers as they engage in a walk with nature.

The garden was commissioned and built by the Fairbanks family, who maintained the garden and developed it into its current spectacular form. This garden represents their many years of effort and hard work.

#4 838 Valleyview Road

The front landscaping is a creation of garden designer Ruth Reitenauer, who is also responsible for the lovely garden across the street. Featured is an English rose garden, informal boxwood hedges and a curved grove of trees with underplanting of groundcover and shrubbery.

Behind the house, plants take precedence over design. There are rose arbors, clematis and sweet pea stakes, a patterned vegetable garden, a box-hedged herb garden, a wildflower walk, along with blueberries, strawberries, asparagus, and much more. This is not a low maintenance garden.

Lupine, digitalis, poppies, nigella, pansies, larkspurs, and columbines are allowed to reseed themselves to create "theme gardens." Besides crowding out weeds, there are plenty of plants to share. During most years, there is something in bloom every day of the year, with hellebores in December and pansies and hardy bulbs early in the year. Special note should also be made of the arbors framing entrance ways to the garden areas right and left.

#5 318 Sleepy Hollow Road

As new homeowners, landscaping was a means of sprucing up the property. Since then it's become a hobby and a form of relaxation. We not only enjoy the beauty of the trees and shrubbery but also appreciate their ability to insulate us from the traffic of a busy street.

#6. 471 Haverhill Road

This lovely garden is nestled in the charming area of Sunset Hills. The gardeners are a young professional couple with two preschool-age children. For the past 4 years they have been transforming the area around the wooden deck into an evergreen, low maintenance garden

where they can sit at the end of a busy day and feel refreshed. They have planted such greenery as blue rug juniper, emerald and gold euonymus, evergreen rhododendrons, rose bushes, a Bradford pear tree and a red Japanese maple tree, all of which helps to round out the back hillside plantings.

Every year a vegetable garden is planted to give the family fresh tomatoes, zucchini, bush beans, green and red bell peppers and of course some delicious radishes.

Bonus Garden-- Southminster Church

Take some time to enjoy Southminster Church's attractive planting at the church and the manse. The landscaping delights pedestrians through all the seasons. Look for the tricolor beech and redbud tree by the church and an unusual Redwood Tree at the Manse.

DIRECTIONS TO THE GARDENS

These suggested directions are designed for those unfamiliar with local short cuts. This route will keep you on main roads and give you a good view of Mt. Lebanon's different neighborhoods.

#1 109 JEFFERSON DRIVE

House is at the corner of Washington Road and Jefferson Drive, a short walk from the library. Parking in the library's lot is recommended. If you decide to drive, turn right when exiting the parking lot, then right at the next intersection onto Hemlock Street. Proceed up and down Hemlock until it ends, then turn right onto Jefferson Drive. 109 is on the right at the corner of Washington Road.

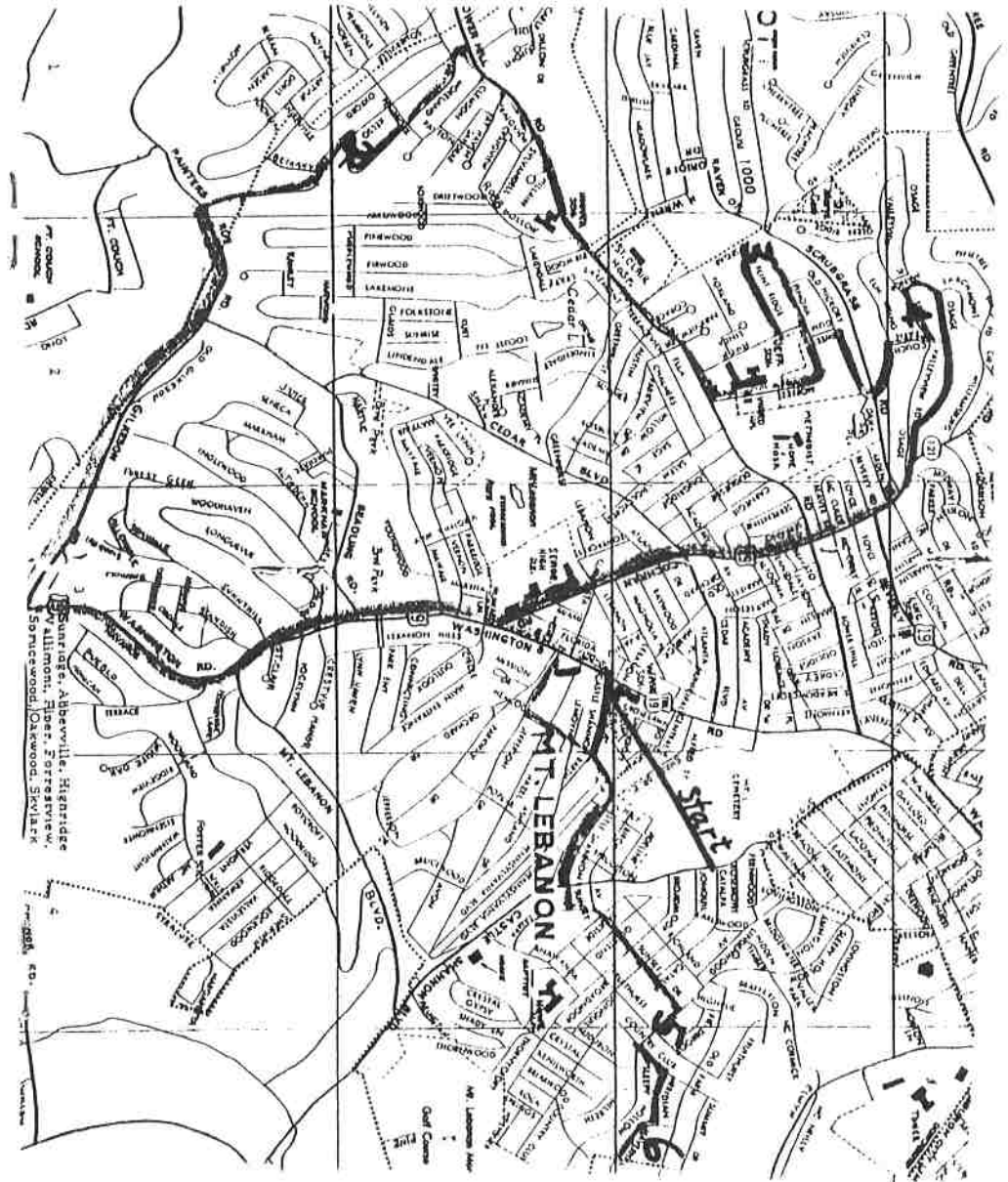
#2 695 MORELAND ROAD

Cross the "boulevard green strip" which separates Jefferson Drive from Orchard Drive and proceed on Orchard to the traffic light at Washington Road. Turn left onto Washington Road and travel 1.5 miles to the intersection with Connor & Gilkeson Roads. Turn right onto Gilkeson and proceed past the Galleria. Gilkeson Road becomes Painters Run Road at the 2nd traffic light. Continue straight ahead on Painters Run for .3 mile. Turn right at Walt's Tavern onto Robb Hollow Road. Moreland Road is the 1st right about halfway up the hill. 695 is the first house on the right.

#3 781 PINOAK ROAD

Continue up Moreland to intersection with Kelso Road. Turn right onto Kelso and proceed to traffic light at Bower Hill Road. Turn right onto Bower Hill and drive 1.2 miles to Moffett Street. (Moffett is the 2nd traffic light past the St. Clair Hospital/Segar Road intersection.) Turn left onto Moffett and go straight ahead to the intersection with Pinoak Road. Turn left onto Pinoak and continue past Sweet Gum and Old Hickory Roads. 781 is the 7th house on the right after Old Hickory.

838 VALLEYVIEW ROAD

Continue up Flint Ridge Road to the stop sign. Turn left onto Ruth Street, right onto Pinoak, then a quick left onto Sweet Gum. Turn right onto Old Hickory and continue down the hill to the 4-way stop at Scrubgrass Road. Go directly across Scrubgrass onto Elm Spring Road. Travel along Elm Spring to the 1st right and take Couch Farm Road to the top of the hill. Turn left onto Valleyview. 838 is the 4th house on the right.

#5

318 SLEEPY HOLLOW ROAD

When leaving Valleyview, continue straight ahead one-half block to the intersection with Manor Place and turn right. Then turn right again onto Osage Road. At the 2nd stop sign bear left and proceed to the traffic light at Cochran Road. Turn right and stay on Cochran until it ends at the intersection with Washington Road. Turn left onto Washington Road, then right at the 2nd traffic light onto Castle Shannon Boulevard.

*At this point in your tour, why not pause
as you go past the library for refreshments
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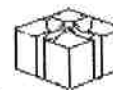
If you choose not to stop, continue on Castle Shannon Boulevard (stay on the brick road as it turns) until the first traffic light. Proceed directly ahead up Sunset Road (hill) and down to Sleepy Hollow Road. Turn right onto Sleepy Hollow. 318 is on the right.

#6

471 HAVERHILL ROAD

Continue on Sleepy Hollow to stop sign. Turn left onto Country Club Drive, then take first right onto Meridian and the next right onto Haverhill. 471 is on the left.

WHEN LEAVING Haverhill, proceed straight ahead to Edgeridge and turn left, then left again at next intersection onto Old Farm Road and left again onto Country Club. At first stop sign turn right onto Sleepy Hollow, then left onto Sunset. Proceed on Sunset to Castle Shannon Boulevard. A left turn takes you to Route 88; a right turn puts you on Scott Road which goes to Route 19. To return to the library, go straight ahead on Castle Shannon Boulevard and follow the brick road.

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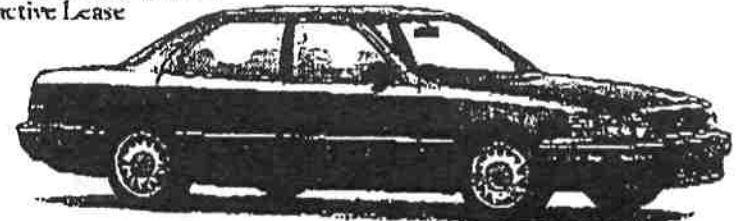


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
