

Our speaker for the November meeting was Rebecca Kichta Miller on "Finding Your Irish Ancestors". She started off dispelling a couple of myths:

- Irish records were all lost in a fire - many but not all and more and more records are becoming accessible
- Your name was changed at Ellis Island - no, the ship's manifest was filled out before a person left the departure port. Your ancestor may have changed their name once they got here, and for many reasons.

Irish records are often organized by townland, which is not necessarily an organized entity but more of a neighborhood within some larger entity. If your Irish ancestors were still living in Ireland when the 1901 or 191 census you can find that when searching those censuses here:

Very few census records prior to 1901 survived the fire of 1922.
