That was followed by a talk by Jim Stuber on other sources of immigration records if you do not have access to Ancestry, or if your ancestor doesn't show up in Ancestry databases. There is much overlap between the databases but each has been indexed separately so you may not find your ancestor on one but will in one of the others. Those three sites are:
