Some general observations as you read Elissa's handout:

- Online trees are superior if you're collaborating, or want to collaborate, with other people researching the same ancestors
- If privacy is a concern to you, software running on your PC is superior. You can set your online tree to private, or limit the people that can view it, but that may reduce interaction with new people. If you want to maintain complete privacy from DNA searches you have to take an additional step and click the box in privacy settings to turn that off
- If you want to do reporting from your tree, especially if you want to print a family history, the PC products are the software of choice
- You can, and many people do, maintain both online trees and PC software trees
- If you use Ancestry for your tree it's yours to maintain. If you use FamilySearch Family Tree, your tree is shared for anyone to update. If a tree is updated the person who did it is identified, and they are encouraged to explain their reason. You may be able to quickly grow your tree by connecting your ancestor(s) to an existing tree.
