When you search, I suggest you put the full name in quotes to reduce the number of of search results to those most relevant to you. You will usually search for the name of an organization your ancestor was associated with, not their name. You can visit the library and archives at no cost, and you can contact them via email or phone and they'll help you determine what records might be of interest.

If your ancestors were Catholic, the Pittsburgh Diocese Archive is the place to get their records. They operate only by mail or email and charge a reasonable fee. Here's their information: <https://diopitt.org/genealogy>
